Phil Dye began his work-life as a teacher in Nowra on the South Coast of NSW. After 16 years in education, he retrained in Communication Management specializing in science and medical communication.



He worked for the NSW Blood Service and the Australian Bone Marrow Registry before eventually becoming the National Communication Manager for Organ Donation. He won awards for telling people how to recycle body parts without making them feel sick.

Phil went on to lecture in Communication at UTS and in 1998, wrote 'The Father Lode', published by Allen and Unwin. He continued to teach casually, lecture in Communication and write for newspapers nationally.

In 2014 he became an Educator in the School of Medical Sciences at the University of NSW. His role was to make complex things simple and use plain English to teach everyone from school aged children to visiting overseas medical delegations. Neuroscience and the workings of the brain were his speciality.

"Throughout my life, biological reality has been essential in my work. The facts of science, while uncomfortable for some, are vital for our understanding of ourselves and the world.

Central to biological reality is the fact there are only two sexes – Male and Female. We can't change sex – ever."

As an accomplished musician and performer, he was mentioned in 2020 by Federal Parliament for his 'Songs for Lockdown' concerts to isolated communities during covid.

"I didn't deserve such accolades as it got me out of the house without being arrested. I'll accept it though."

In March 2024 he was diagnosed with HPV related tongue cancer. He spent most of the year without speaking and being fed by stomach tube.

"This reinforced for me that science and medicine must be trusted. 35 radiation sessions were bloody awful, yet without them, I wouldn't be around today."

As well as being the Founder of, and on the Committee for the Declaration of Biological Truth, he hosts the <u>Philtered</u> and <u>Marking the Role</u> podcasts. Both are available on <u>Substack</u> or all streaming services.
